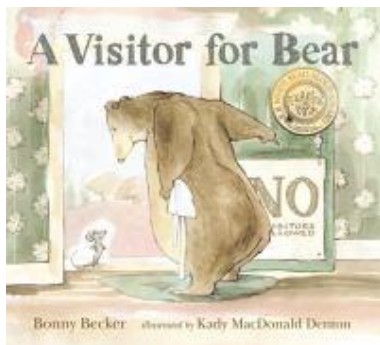


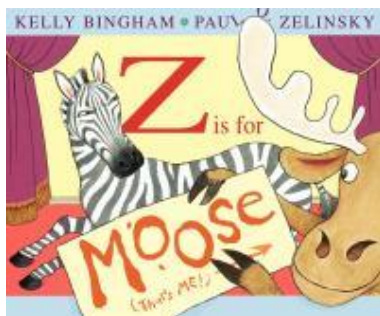
Ada Twist, Scientist

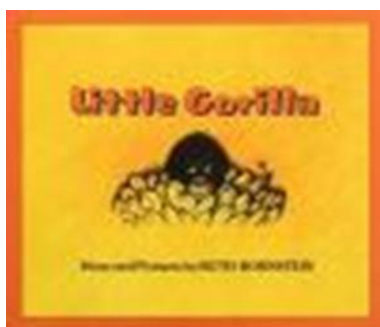
A Visitor for Bear

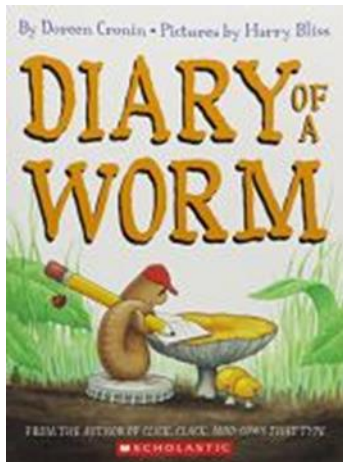
Z is for Moose

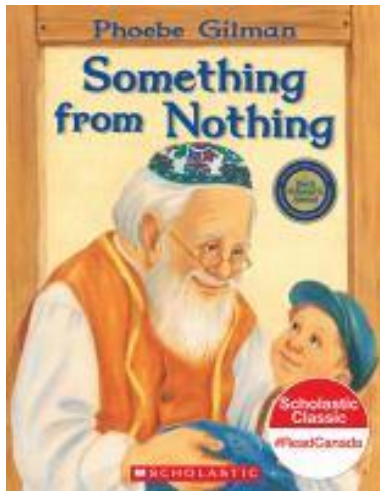
Stella, Star of the Sea

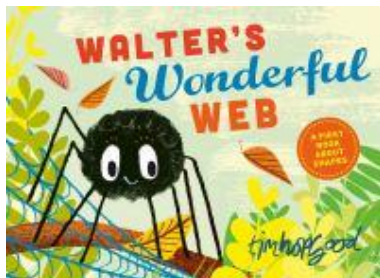
One Big Pair of Underwear

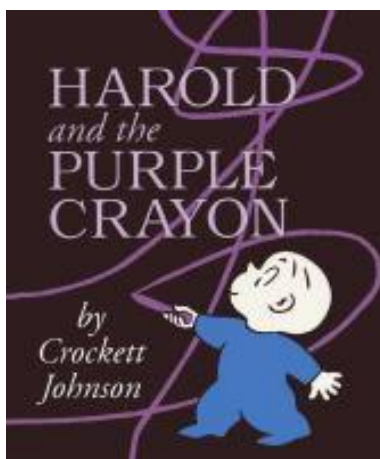
Something From Nothing

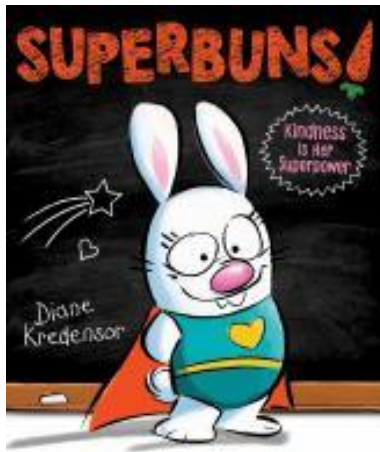
Walter's Wonderful Web

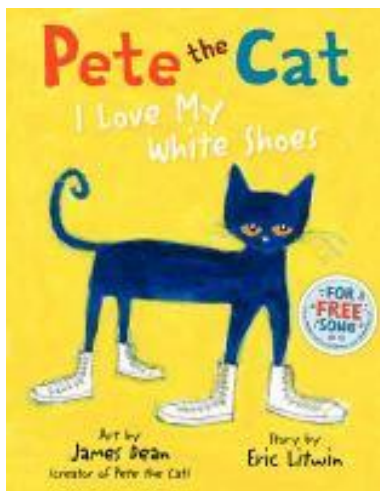
Harold and the Purple Crayon

Despite what her younger sister thinks, Blossom is sure that kindness is not a superpower, until the sisters meet a fox that changes Blossom's opinion.



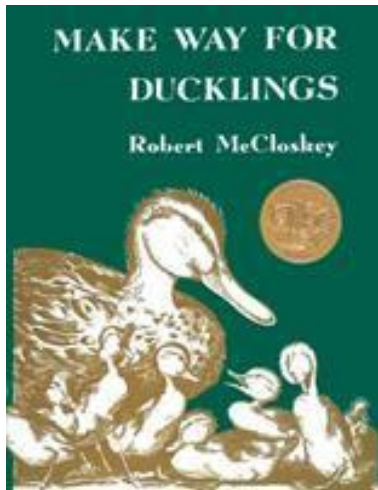
Pete the Cat: I Love My White Shoes

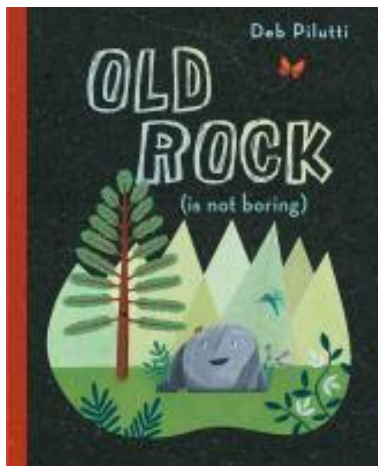
Make Way for Ducklings

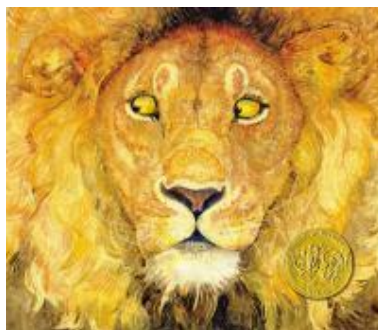
It's Time For Bed

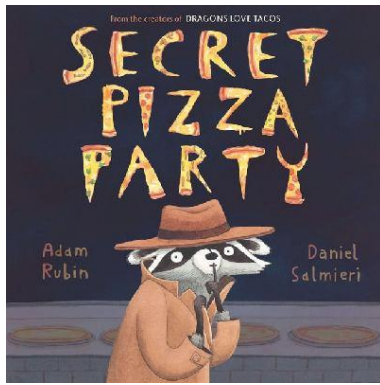
Old Rock (is not Boring)

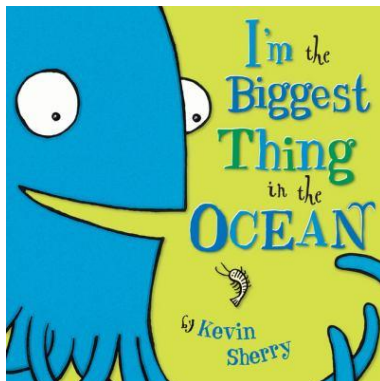
Secret Pizza Party

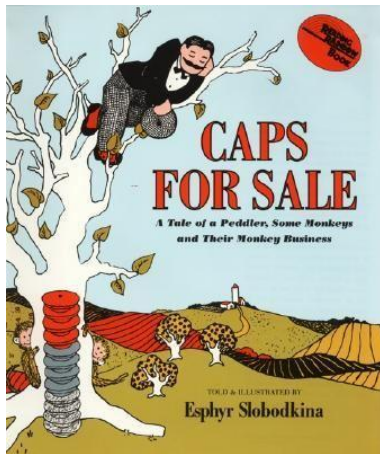
Henry and Mudge: the First Book

By: Sherry, Kevin

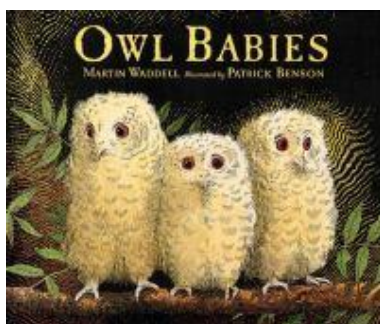

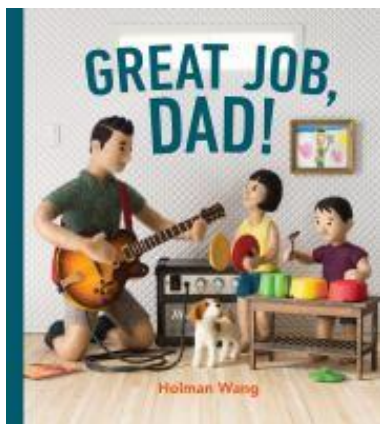

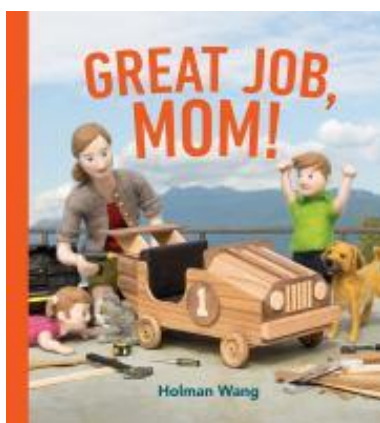
Three owl babies whose mother has gone out in the night try to stay calm while she is gone.
