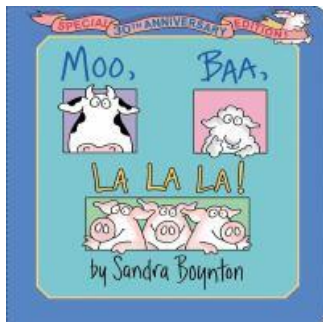


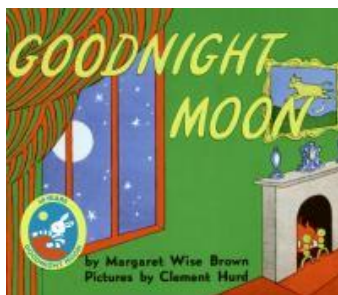
Whose knees are these?

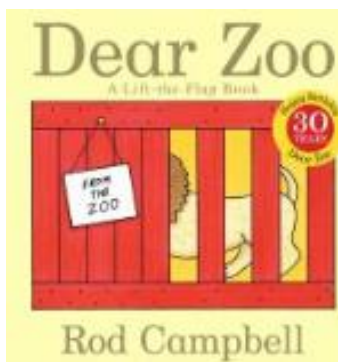
Moo Baa LaLa La!

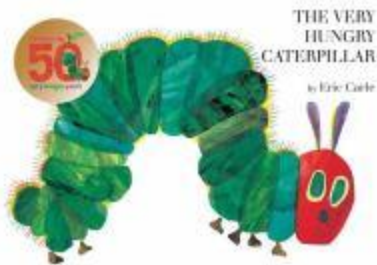
Goodnight Moon

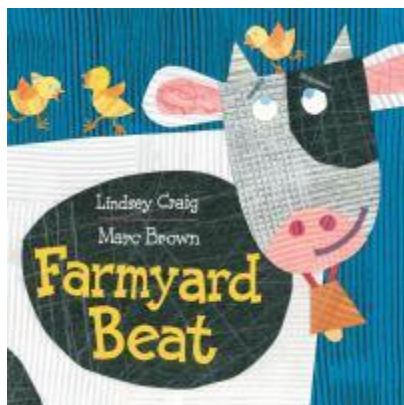
Dear Zoo

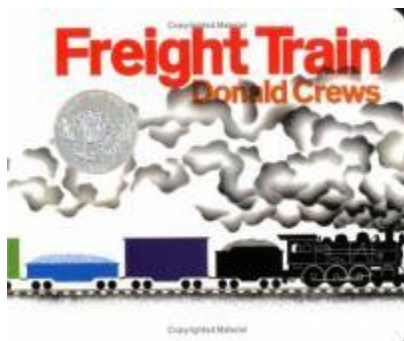
The very hungry caterpillar

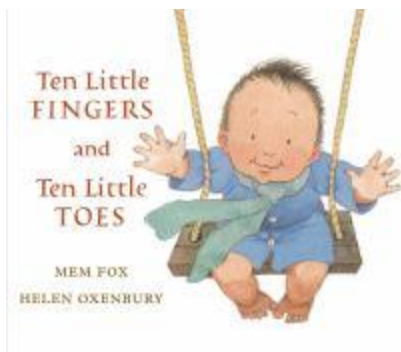
Freight train

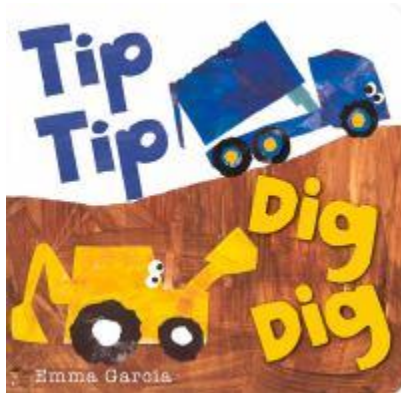
Kisses Kisses Baby-O!

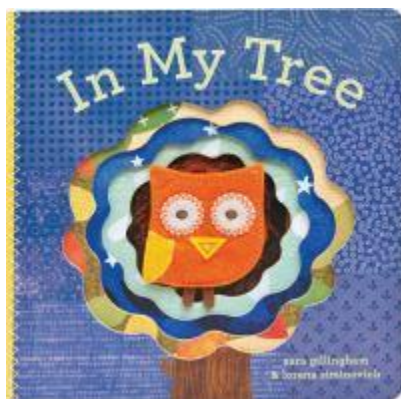
Ten Little Fingers and Ten Little toes

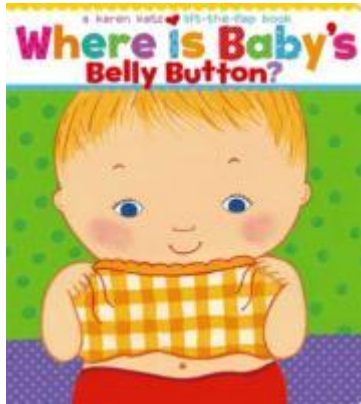
In My Tree

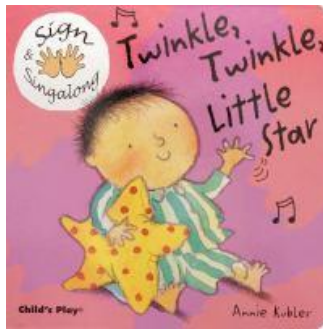
Black on White

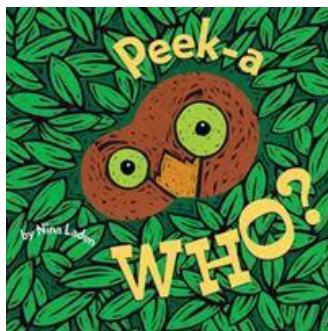
Where is Baby's Belly Button?

Karen Katz's adorable babies play peekaboo in this delightful interactive book. The sturdy format and easy-to-lift flaps are perfect for parents and children to share.



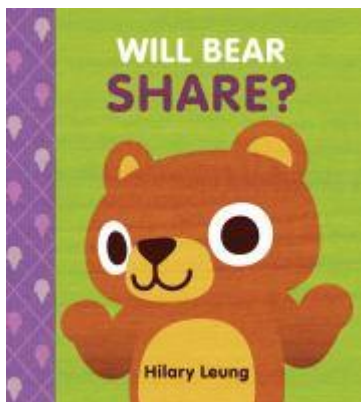
Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star

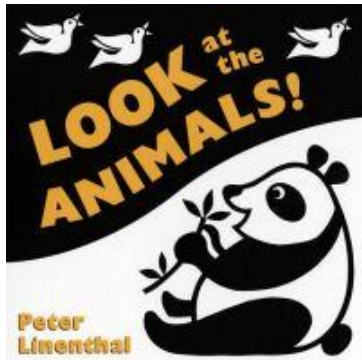
Peek-a-who?

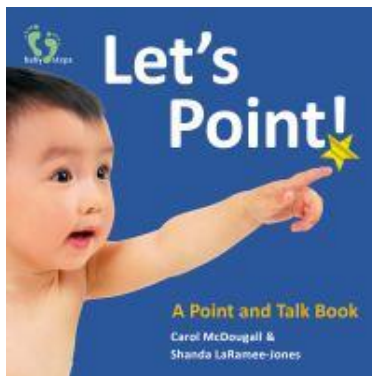
Will Bear Share?

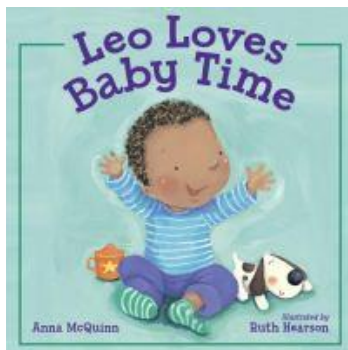
Looks at the Animals!

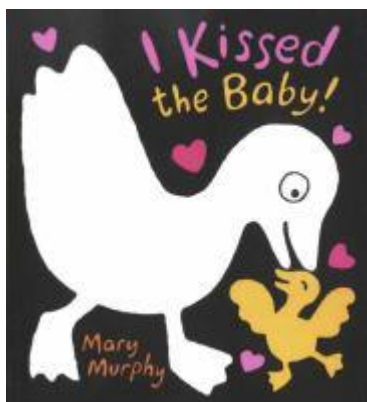
Let's Point!

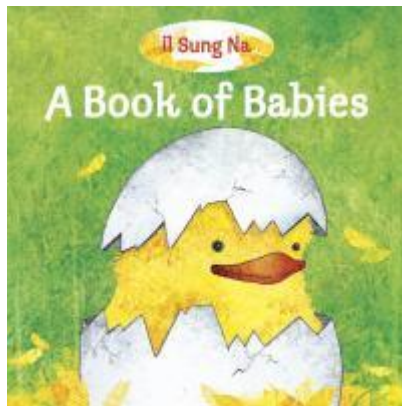
Leo Loves Baby Time

By Na, Il Sung

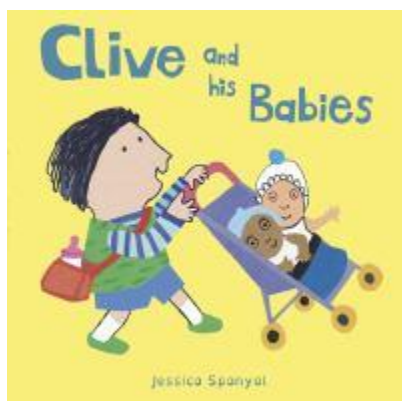

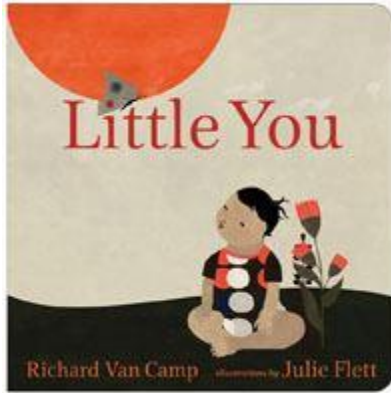
Clive and His Babies
